Title 17 – Health and Safety Chapter 8 – Research Code

- The "Research Code" was enacted and codified as 17 Tohono O'odham Code Chapter 8 by Resolution No. 13-165 effective May 23, 2013
- October 2017, the first person was appointed to the Board
- May of 2021, 3 additional members were appointed with the 5th board position being filled in August of 2021
 - ► First Official IRB Meeting took place in May 2021

TON IRB Mission Statement

The mission of the Tohono O'odham Institutional Review Board (IRB) is to approve and oversee all research and systematic collection of data on the Tohono O'odham Nation and its members. The TONIRB assesses and evaluates the risks and benefits of proposed research to ensure that risks are minimized and are justified by the potential benefits of the research to the Tohono O'odham Nation and its members. The IRB is committed to respecting and protecting the Tohono O'odham Nation's values and sovereignty through culturally competent and customized research.

"Research"

The use of systematic methods to gather and analyze information for the purpose of proving or disproving a hypothesis, evaluating concepts or practices or otherwise adding to knowledge and insight in a particular discipline or field of knowledge or to demonstrate or investigate theories, techniques or practices.

"Research" includes but not limited to the following:

- 1) Basic and clinical research
- 2) Behavioral studies
- 3) Anthropological studies
- 4) Community based participatory research
- 5) Practice based research
- 6) Cultural or historical research

- 7) Feasibility and other studies designed to develop, test and evaluate basic data in all phases of environmental and public health. Changes in development, testing, or evaluation must be preapproved by the Tohono O'odham Nation IRB
- 8) Research on plants, animals, water, land, air, or weather

Noteworthy

This Chapter shall apply to all research conducted within the Nation, whether involving human subjects or not, and all research regarding materials wherever located as to which the Nation has a claim of intellectual, cultural, or other ownership.

Why is this Important to keep in mind?

Research (Mainstream Institutions)

- Generally associated with Universities
 - Professors publication, public presentations
 - Graduate students Thesis or Dissertation, public presentations
- There are two types of research
 - Research that does not need to b reviewed and approved – non-human subjects research
 - Research that must be reviewed and approved – human subjects research
 - Institutional Review Boards (IRB)



When IRB approval is needed (Mainstream Institutions)

- Needed when research involves "Human Subjects"
- Collaborative Institutional Training CITI Program www.citiprogram.org
- Example of Trainings Provided:
 - Conflict of Interest
 - Humanities Responsible Conduct or Research
 - Native American Research
 - Social and Behavioral Responsible Conduct of Research

When & Why did American Indian Nations start regulating research?

- Differing Worldview Indigenous Ethics differ from mainstream/western ethics
 - University IRB's protect the Institution first
- What has changed since Havasupai Case?
 - Universities
 - Informed Consent
 - ► ABOR Tribal Consultation Policy #1-118
 - American Indian Communities (Federally Recognized Tribes)
 - Tribes Asserting their inherent Sovereignty by instituting Tribal Research Law/Policies

How to apply for a research permit:

- Step 1: Prior to applying for a permit please review the Tohono O'odham Nation Research Code <u>Title 17 – Health and Safety</u>, <u>Chapter 8 – Research Code</u>
- Step 2: Complete a research proposal and submit to <u>IRB@tonation-nsn.gov</u>

It is vital that prior to reaching out to the IRB both the TON Research Code and Proposal Outline be thoroughly reviewed by the research team.
