Public Service Announcement
Weather Advisory (August 10 - 14, 2026)
August 10th, 2026

The National Weather Service has issued a Flash Flood Watch for Monday afternoon and evening (2-10 PM), with excessive rainfall posing a risk to roadway dips, washes. A more active monsoon pattern continues through the week, bringing daily thunderstorm chances with strong wind gusts, blowing dust, small hail, and lightning, with Monday and Wednesday flagged as potentially more active days with an increased flash flood risk. Heat risk is locally moderate through Monday before easing to minor levels for the rest of the week, with temperatures near normal Monday, dipping below normal Tuesday–Friday, then rising above normal over the weekend.

Key Points:

- **A Flash Flood Watch** has been issued for Pima, Santa Cruz, and SE Pinal Counties for Monday afternoon and evening.
- **More active monsoon pattern** continues across southeastern Arizona with daily storm chances (20-40%).
- **Monday and Wednesday** looks to be potentially more active with (40-60%) chance for showers and storms across southeast Arizona.
- **Locally Moderate Heat Risk** on Monday, then again Saturday and Sunday; Minor Heat Risk Tuesday through Friday as high temperatures cool to near to below normal.
- **Cooling Centers** – Recreation centers will be open during regular hours from 8:00 AM – 8:00 PM this Saturday, August 15th, 2026. Stay tuned for additional updates on cooling shelter availability in your community.
